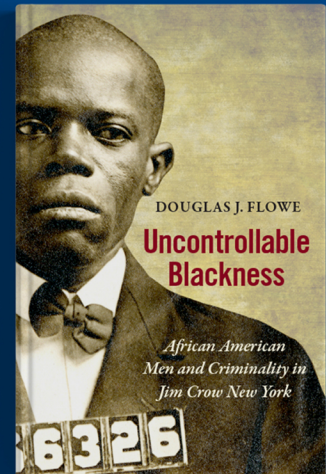

Please join us for a conversation led by **Dr. Cheryl Hicks** (Africana Studies/History) with author **Dr. Douglas Flowe** on his new book, "*Uncontrollable Blackness: African American Men and Criminality in Jim Crow New York*."

Douglas Flowe is an Assistant Professor of History at Washington University in St. Louis where he teaches courses on urban history, criminality, masculinity, and other subjects relating to race, crime, and gender. He received his Ph.D. at the University of Rochester and has recently published his first book, *Uncontrollable Blackness: African American Men and Criminality in Jim Crow New York* (UNC Press). His work has appeared in publications such as the *Journal of Urban History* and the *Journal of African American History*, and he is currently working on a second book that will trace the experiences of black inmates in the mid-twentieth century carceral state.
